


What does it mean to be an au pair?



Beginning when I first arrived, and throughout every situation since, my host family continues to help me, share with me, teach me as much as they can, and push me to fulfill my dreams. They


love me. Today, I feel like you don't really know me until you've heard about them. We believe that we were meant to be in each other's lives for good.


take some time to tidy up and prepare snacks at home before picking up my host kids from school around 3:00pm.


